

## **Building security**

The impact of a theft or break-in can be far reaching. Beyond the damage or property loss, it is also a drain on the church's resources and its mission to the community. On a personal level it can also impact your sense of safety with a feeling of violation.

Depending on the local church's budget a number of security measures can be put into place, below are some suggestions:

- Sufficient lighting inside and outside can act as a deterrant to unlawful activities.
- Keep outdoor shrubs and trees trimmed to avoid providing places where an individual could conceal themselves.
- Keep the site well maintained and neatly presented sends a message that the church cares for its property and its people. When a site is neglected those outsiders are less likely to care about it too which can make the site vulnerable.
- Keep internal doors locked to reduce the loss in the event of an intrusion.
- CCTV with careful planning is both a deterrant to intruders and can provide valuable evidence in many types of loss events.
- A monitored alarm system including access control cards (instead of keys) can provide security on many fronts.
